







## Making a Memory Quilt



<p><b>Supplies:</b></p> <p>Coordinating fabric, at least one colour must be light, with no pattern, suitable for transferring iron-on transfers.</p>		<p><b>Equipment</b></p> <p>Computer w/image cropping software                  Colour Scanner                  Colour printer                  Computer iron-on transfer paper</p>
<p><b>Step 1.</b></p> <p>Choose a theme for the quilt: what "memories" do you want to share? Children, pets, family members, places, events, are all ideas to include on a memory quilt.</p>		
<p><b>Step 2.</b></p> <p>Collect and capture (scan) photographs. Print images to computer iron-on transfer paper. (Remember to reverse image print.) This can be a family endeavour.</p>		
<p><b>Step 3.</b></p> <p>Decide on a quilt pattern. Choose one that can accommodate your iron-on transfer images, F.</p>		
<p><b>Step 4.</b></p>		

<p>Cut out quilt pieces A-E.</p>	
<p><b>Step 5.</b> Cut out and apply iron-on transfer F to your plain pattern quilt piece, E.</p>	
<p><b>Step 6.</b> Join quilt pieces together to create a quilt block.</p>	
<p><b>Step 7.</b> Join quilt blocks together to create the quilt cover.</p>	
<p><b>Step 8.</b> Apply quilt batting and quilt back fabric. Join quilt top, batting and quilt back fabric.</p>	
<p><b>Step 9.</b> Enjoy! Remember to take a photograph of the quilt.</p>
